Day 1

Morning

Young Blood Coffee Co.

Fargo's craft coffee scene deserves to be your first stop in the morning... and you can get more than caffeinated. The gourmet toast menu at <u>Young Blood Coffee Co.</u> will fill you up with something warm and (excuse the pun) toasty. Couple that with a hot cup of Joe and you're ready to tackle the rest of your wintry day.

Hjemkomst Center

Duration: 2 hours

This <u>Scandinavian culture center</u> showcases a replica Norwegian stave church, a Viking ship that actually sailed from Minnesota to Norway, and one of the region's largest art collections. You can also take a guided tour of the inside of the stave church, they're scheduled each hour (the views are incredible!).

Snowshoeing

If there's snow on the ground (which is pretty likely in a Fargo winter), you can rent snowshoes at <u>Edgewood Golf Course</u>, and <u>M.B. Johnson Park</u>, and take to the park along the river for some good tromping through the flakes. Added bonus: snowshoeing burns between 420 and 1000 calories per hour.

Afternoon

Teddy's Eatery + Parlor

This <u>gourmet grilled cheese bistro</u> is the perfect place to warm up and refuel after snowshoeing. Its cozy interior looks out onto Downtown Fargo's main street, so you can people-watch while you eat your weight in grilled cheese goodness.

Evening

Wurst Bier Hall

Wandering around the art museum and puzzling your way out of the escape room will probably leave you a tad hungry. Luckily, you're steps away from one of the top recommended spots for local food in Fargo: Wurst Bier Hall.

Long, wooden tables fill this German-style pub. Order a boot of German beer (or a classic local draft) and some weinerschnitzel, spaetzle mac & cheese, or gourmet wurst sausages.

Day 2

Morning

The Shack on Broadway

This <u>mom-and-pop diner</u> is a local favorite... you'll see why as soon as you arrive. Its classic diner interior means cozy booths, friendly waitstaff, and the smell of home-cooked food in the air. We recommend one of their massive omelettes, a delicious stack of pancakes, and a huge caramel roll (if you can manage to fit it all in).

Pro tip: If you're in Fargo on a weekend, make sure to get here early. The "after church" crowd starts arriving around 9 a.m. on Sundays, so you may have to wait for a table if you come much later than that.

Red River Zoo

Duration: 1 hour

Fargo's accredited zoo specializes in the care and breeding of some of the world's rarest cold climate species. Don't be surprised when you see camels and red pandas out in the snow... they're actually cold-weather breeds who normally live in places with similar weather to Fargo.

Call ahead to see if you can schedule a guided tour and to find out if any special events or zookeeper talks will be happening during your visit.

The Red River Zoo also has special winter hours from 10 am to 5 pm every day.

Souvenir shopping in Downtown Fargo

Evening

Vinyl Taco

Music and Mexican street food set <u>Vinyl Taco</u> apart from every other Mexican restaurant in town. Instead of large plates, you can order individual street tacos.

Inside, you'll be surrounded by musical artwork, exposed brick walls, and a central bar guarded by a bison statue. Menus come on record albums, the margaritas are served with giant rosemary leaves, and vinyl records spin behind the bar.

Note: You must be 21 to enter and eat here.

Nichole's Fine Pastry is closed on Sundays and Mondays, so if you're looking for dessert on those days, head to one of Fargo's gourmet ice cream shops. You have three downtown ice cream options: <u>Silver Linings Creamery</u> for small-batch and experimental ice cream flavors, <u>Scoop N Dough Candy Co.</u> for cookie dough and ice cream medleys, or <u>Tea & Crepe Cafe</u> for trendy Thai rolled ice cream.

Wild Terra Cider Bar

If there's one thing Fargo has plenty of, it's places to have an adult craft beverage. After dinner and dessert, experience the craft beer or cider scene with one of these three options (or check out <u>all eight of Fargo's breweries</u>).

The only urban cidery in the entire state, <u>Wild Terra</u> is a great alternative if you want a craft beverage that isn't beer. They make their own ciders in-house and include regional varieties on their menu. Housed in a converted horse barn, peaked ceilings, bold wallpaper, and comfy leather couches make it a great place to just hang out.
